# Warren County StormReady – By: Rick Murray


StormReady is a nationwide community preparedness program that uses a grassroots approach to help communities develop plans to handle all types of severe weather—from tornadoes to tsunamis. The program encourages communities to take a new, proactive approach to improving local hazardous weather operations by providing emergency managers with clear-cut guidelines on how to improve their hazardous weather operations.

To be officially StormReady, a community must,

- Establish a 24-hour warning point and emergency operations center.
- Have more than one way to receive severe weather warnings and forecasts and to alert the public.
- Create a system that monitors weather conditions locally.
- Promote the importance of public readiness through community seminars.
- Develop a formal hazardous weather plan, which includes training severe weather spotters and holding emergency exercises.

Warren County became an Accredited Storm Ready County the first half of 2014. Statistically we are the third county in Southwest Ohio to receive this recognition, the 24<sup>th</sup> County Statewide out of 88 counties and nationwide as of 2013 we are one of 1038 counties out of 3144 counties nationwide to achieve the recognition.

# **Did You Know?**

#### **New Call Types & Call Signs**

The following new call types have been added into CAD:

- SEB, FSEB and MSEB These call types are used when creating a call for a School Emergency Button Activation.
- DEX This call type is used when dispatching police units to a Dangerous Exotic Wild Animal Call.
  It is a priority 4 call and only requires a single car response. The Fire and EMS call types for this incident are FDEX and MDEX

The following call sign has been added to CAD:

• WR – This unit is used for water rescue calls. When this unit is recommended it will appear as WR81 (Water Rescue Station 81) and the capability is specific to this vehicle and is recommended for specific call types. The Technical Rescue Team will take it on all water rescue runs. It includes their ice/water suits, swift water equip and diving equipment.

## **MARCS in School Security Radios**

The MARCS in School Security Radios went live on August 1st. The purpose of these radios are to provide schools with a quick and direct line of contact to the communications center during a violent, life threatening situation, such as an active shooter/assailant. When the communications center receives activation they will create a call in CAD using the call type SEB which will create both law and fire incidents. The fire department will follow their Mass Casualty Incident Plan and Law Enforcement will issue a County All-Call. The radio will then have 10 seconds of open mic for the school personnel to vocalize the situation if safe to do so. If there is an accidental activation the school personnel will vocalize on the radio that the button was pressed in error, however, it will be treated as if it is a real incident. The first law enforcement officer on scene will size up the situation and notify the communications center, confirming it was pressed in error. Schools will test their radios August 1st -September 7th and March 1st – March 31st to make sure all information is relayed correctly and school personnel are familiar with the procedure. Schools covered by Warren County Communications Center and Franklin City will show up on the Warren County Radio system, including Warren County Career Center. If there is activation for a school in the City of Franklin, the supervisor or ECOIC will relay the activation and any additional information to Franklin Dispatch. Franklin Dispatch does have a radio in their communication center to monitor the activation as well.

## **EMA Updating Mitigation Plan** – By Jim Bolen

In February of 2013, the Warren County EMA drafted a grant to update the Warren County Hazard Mitigation Plan. This plan discusses the hazards which exist in and around Warren County and describes strategies to reduce the impact these hazards have on the citizens and visitors of Warren County. The county was awarded a grant of \$43,811 to accomplish this update. The Warren County EMA hosted the first of three public meetings to discuss and develop the plan on July 31st. The meeting was well attended and included over forty representatives from local, state and federal officials, public interest groups and public safety officials. The attendees worked with Warren County EMA staff and our contractor, the Michael Baker Group, to rank the hazards affecting the county and their potential outcomes. This information will be used throughout the development of the plan and proposed mitigation strategies. The next public meeting is scheduled in the Commissioner's Meeting Room (Room 128A) on September 25th at 10am. This meeting will focus on developing the mitigation strategies which will guide how the county prevents damage from events such as severe storms and floods. The meeting is open to the public and you are encouraged to attend if you are able.

#### Franklin's New Dispatch Center

On Saturday August 16th Franklin Dispatch held an open house to unveil their newly remolded dispatch center. They opened up their dispatch center and police department to the public. They had tours of the PD, dispatch center, and their Jail as well as activities set up for kids. The new dispatch center consists of two new dispatch consoles as well as room to add one more in the future. They also added several monitors on the walls to monitor the PD cameras and cameras in the probation department. The consoles they have can be raised and/or lowered depending on the dispatcher's preference. Both consoles also have 6 monitors which have their CAD, radios, 911, LEADS, and various other programs.



#### **Call of the Month**

#### Robbery in Progress at Chase Bank

On August 2<sup>nd</sup> at 12:06 Ron Kronenberger answered a 911 call from Chase Bank in Springboro, advising that a white male entered the bank and walked up to a teller insisting on money. The male never displayed a weapon and shortly left the bank in an unknown direction. Witnesses later said they saw a male matching that description running up Springwood Dr. Units from Springboro PD, Clearcreek PD, Franklin PD and the Sheriff's Office responded to the bank and quickly set up a perimeter, closing down St. Rt. 73. Once units arrived on scene they cleared the bank and requested a K9 respond for a track. The first K9 tracked for a short amount of time before a 2<sup>nd</sup> K9 from Waynesville PD was called in to pick up the track. A 3<sup>rd</sup> K9 was also called from Mason PD. Units tracked until around 14:40. At one point units on scene considered calling BCSO helicopter. Units remained on scene for several more hours collecting evidence. We also received a call from Middletown PD stating that earlier in the day a male matching the description entered the Chase Bank on Breiel Blvd, but fled on foot when approached by one of the employees. The incident is still under investigation. The dispatcher on Police Primary was Liz Hollon and Ashlee Gibson monitored the TAC Channel for the track. Great work by all those involved!
