Call of the Month

On June 9, 2016 at around 8 p.m., Ava Campbell was working as a calltaker when she took a call for an active domestic dispute on Jonathan Lane in Deerfield Township. Ava released the call to be dispatched while she remained on the phone, obtaining further information and working through the protocols. Erin Caito was dispatching on Police Primary 2 and immediately advised 8P37 (Katie Barnes) and 8P80 (Sgt. Langdon). After speaking with all of the parties involved, 8P37 (879) cleared the call.



Later there was a second call from the same address. Just as

Ava answered, the phone was dropped and all Ava could hear was screaming. When someone finally came on the line they told Ava that the brother, Mohammad, had threatened to kill them.

He had gone outside to his car. Suddenly the caller told Ava that he could see Mohammad walking back carrying a gun. Ava quickly advised him to lock the door. As they were attempting to do this, the subject shot his father in the hand.

8P37 arrived back out at the scene and at 9:48 p.m., called out that she had been shot. She was trying to move away from the area but at the same time let responding units know that she did not know the location of the armed assailant. All primary traffic

was restricted and multiple units and agencies advised that they were responding to help in the search for the shooter.



Those on duty that night included Supervisor Ron Kronenberger, Emily Smitley, Tramel Waddell, Jesse Madden, Cassidy Gatio, Kelly Fiebig and Brad Edrington all working behind the scenes during this incident, dispatching additional incidents, calling for resources with all of the other day -to-day functions that still go on. The entire crew displayed professionalism pulling together as a team! Great job all!



Married with 4 children ranging in age from 7 years to 1 year, Jonathan enjoys movies, family activities and riding motorcycles in his spare time.



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


IPAWS

The Integrated Public Alert and Warning System (IPAWS) is a modernization and integration of the nation's alert and warning infrastructure and will save time when time matters most, protecting life and property. Recently Warren County used this system to alert those in the area during the shooting of a Warren County Sheriff's Deputy to shelter indoors.

The System that we use is from Alert FM. Alert FM is a FEMA certified and secure, cloud-based portal which enables federal, state, and local emergency officials to create a Common Alerting Protocol (CAP) formatted alert and distribute them to multiple contact paths simultaneously.





There are several prefor-

matted "Event Types" that can be selected to send out such alerts and messages such as: National Weather Service ("NWS") weather warnings, evacuation instructions, homeland security notices, Amber Alerts, or school closings. This information can be delivered via the data subcarrier of existing FM radio stations, SMS (text) and email, Apple iOS and Google Android Smartphone applications, Twitter, and/or Facebook. This is done by drawing specific areas on the map which are to receive the warning or by selecting the entire county.

In The Spotlight

Summer Camp in Warren County By Brian Holtel

With summer in full swing, many of us realize that the schools sit empty while Kings Island and The Beach are packed with young people and families on a daily basis. But where are the other locations in the county that are highly populated this time of year? The answer is often camps and other places of recreation.

The Many camps in Warren County include Camp Butterworth, Camp Joy, Camp Kern, Camp Lebanon Retreat, Camp Swoneky, Camp Whippoorwill, and Church of God Riverside Campground. These camps are affiliated with Girl Scouts, the YMCA, churches, and the Salvation Army. A single week of camp at one of these locations could host about 100 staff members and 300 participants. These camps have trained staff and their own emergency procedures, ensured by there own organization's standards and typically an accreditation organization, like the American Camp Association. However, when emergencies happen, we must be ready to respond.



Did you know that Camp Joy hosts summer camps for campers with special medical needs (cancer, heart conditions, diabetes, etc.) which are also staffed by hospital medical staff? Camp Kern, Camp Butterworth and the Church of God Riverside Campground border the Little Miami River and Camp Swoneky borders I71. Camp Chautauqua and Camp Graham sit right on our county borders.

Think about all of the activities that make camp fun, but could also cause challenges in emergency situations. Such as lakes and pools; hills and hiking trails through a vast area that is often difficult to reach; ziplines, observation towers, ropes courses, and rock climbing, both indoors and out. Other emergencies could be the result of campfires, horseback riding or shooting ranges.

So, be prepared. Be familiar with the layout of these locations and look into their emergency proce-




dures. Know which camps have multiple entrances and where the nurse's office or infirmary is. Find out which camps have provided emergency contact numbers or gate codes.
